

# Georgia Reciprocity Licensure Requirements

**License transfer/reciprocity applications are available through NABP's Electronic Licensure Transfer Program (ELTP). Reciprocity applicants must also take and pass the MPJE, administered by NABP and the Georgia practical, administered by the Georgia Board of Pharmacy.**

NABP's review process can take 3-5 business days. Additional time may be needed if you have disciplinary actions against any of your licenses. NABP will submit your official license transfer application directly to the Georgia Board of Pharmacy. Upon receipt of the application, the Georgia Board of Pharmacy will contact you for submission of state application fees and supplemental documents. Applicants must reciprocate from a state in which he/she was licensed by examination with a current license and in good standing.

Each candidate submitting an application for a pharmacist license must take and pass the MPJE with an overall passing score of 75%. If you fail the MPJE, NABP requires that you wait 31 days to be re-examined. NAPLEX and MPJE scores are valid for two (2) years.

Applicants who graduated from a foreign school of pharmacy and who are licensed in a state that did not require the FPGEC (Foreign Pharmacy Graduate Examination Committee) Certification, must complete the FPGEC Certification prior to obtaining licensure in Georgia.

The Georgia State Board of Pharmacy reciprocates with all states. Applicants licensed in California after 2004 may apply by reciprocity; however, applicants licensed prior to 2004 must sit for the complete pharmacy examination (NAPLEX and MPJE Examinations). You may transfer scores from California under certain circumstances. Score transfers are reviewed by the board on a case-by-case basis.

Georgia law allows for temporary license; however, the Board typically only issues temporary licenses during situations such as a natural disaster.
